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OFFICIOUS AND LAZY.

A County Hospital Attendant Strongly Condemned.

That everything is not conducted as it should be at night at the City and County Hospital is becoming painfully obvious to residents in that neighborhood and to persons who are compelled to go there for information or on other business.

On Monday night a young woman in a delicate condition was taken there for treatment. Entrance was gained only after considerable trouble. Fully fifteen minutes passed before the obtuse gate-keeper, either through pure stupidity or from the wish to make others feel the weight of his authority, would admit the inquirer after the resident physician.

On January 2d the Seventeenth-street police patrol went to the hospital with a wounded man at 1 o'clock in the morning. After a half hour's clanging of the hospital bell and foot-bell on the wagon, the gate-keeper appeared, with the excuse that he had been 'at supper."

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

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THE ARGUELLOS ARE DIVORCED.

Mrs. Clara L. Arguello was granted a divorce, from Julius J. Arguello: by Judge Seawell yesterday on the ground of failure to provide. The witnesses were she and her sister, Miss Eva Mc-Kee of 3328 Twenty-fourth street. They stated that Arguello had not provided for his wife for two years. The marriage took place on November 27, 1890. At that time Arguello, who belongs to a rich family of Santa Clara, had about \$50,000. Judge Seawell was informed that the young man squandered this money. Mrs. Arguello was awarded the custody of her little daughter, Claire. When she found that she had to support herself she got a position as teacher in the School Department. She was appointed in December, 1898, but in January, 1899, the new Board of Education revoked the appointment of Mrs. Arguello and other teachers. Her suit against the Board to recover her position and salary is pending. Her sister, Miss McKee, is a teacher. The divorce suit was filed on May 17, 1898.

TEACHERS WILL ENJOIN.

A Remarkable Compromise Proposed by the Merchant Creditors.

Mrs. Clara Arguello, a teacher recently dismissed from her position, filed an application yesterday for a writ of mandate. ordering the Board of Education to reinstate her in the department. Her attorneys are Judge W. L. Pierce and Henley & Costello, and she represents sixteen teachers, who were removed at the same time.

The injunction case of Elisha Brooks, principal of the Girls' High School, against Auditor Wells, now being tried in Judge Seawell's court, was continued yesterday morning for one week on a joint motion of the attorneys. It is understood that a compromise is being arranged between the teachers and merchants, by which the teachers will withdraw their suit, permitting the merchant creditors to recover as much of the money due them as the state of the fund will allow. For this concession the merchants will loan the teachers 30 per cent of what may be recovered, and if the teachers succeed afterward in getting any of their November and December salaries they will return the loan. principal of the Girls' High School,

TEACHER'S SUIT IN A BAD WAY.

NO APPARENT RELIEF FOR MISS ARGUELLO.

SHE IS SEEKING LEGAL AID TO REGAIN A LOST PO-SITION.

Judge Senwell Renders a Decision on Demurrer Which Seems to Sustain Her Re-

Miss Clara Arguello met with a setback yesterday in her suit against the Board of Education. She is seeking to compel the Board to restore her to her position as a teacher in the School Department. She was one of a batch of teachers appointed by the old Board at its last meeting in December, but she was subsequently removed by the new Board on January 25th.

Judge Seawell, in considering the case yesterday, overruled a demurrer to the answer filed by the Board of Education. The demurrer was based on the ground that the answer falled to state facts sufficient to constitute a defense. This ruling is important because of an allegation in the answer that Miss Arguello was appointed a regular teacher in the department at a meeting not called in accordance with law.

Miss Arguello claims her position under section 1793 of the Political Code, which forbids the removal of teachers except for insubordination or other causes enumerated in section 1792 of the same code. Judge Seawell attaches much importance to the claim of the Board that the plaintiff was never elected except as a probationary teacher. The word "probationary" does not appear in the statute, but it is taken by the Judge as indicating something that is temporary and conditional. In this view he holds that Miss Arguello is not a teacher within the meaning of

One-half of the boys should do tool work under the direction of the teacher of manual training in the center located here. The other half should be given manual training in their claserooms by one of the requiar teachers. Since no teacher now in the school is capable of giving such instruction. I recommend that one of the present teachers be transferred and some one put in her place who is capable of giving such instruction.






